NORTH HUNTSVILLE LIBRARY


Our new \$9 million North Huntsville Library is in the HOME STRETCH of construction! We expect it to be open for use starting in the **fall!**

Info About **your** new library:

- The library is being built on the old Berachah Center campus, **3011 Sparkman Drive NW.**
- New facility will be approximately 19,000 sq ft occupying the first floor. Upstairs will be renovated into office space for future growth.
- Library and surrounding park total cost is \$10.8 million:
 - The Library Foundation provided \$1.4 million for the library
 - City provided \$7.6 million for the library
 - City added \$1.8 million for the park

Library Floor Plan




Amenities include:

Berachah Complex



"Parks & Recreation looks forward to joining the North Huntsville Library as part of the improved Berachah complex," said Steve Ivey, Huntsville Director of Parks & Recreation. "Berachah Park will be a wonderful addition to the indoor gym and community space presently run by our department. With the growth across our City, this investment will enable us to expand our reach at Berachah to include outdoor activities such as walking, football and family gatherings."

Councill High School Park

It was a memory, then a dream, and now a vision fulfilled for hundreds of alumni of William Hooper Councill High School, Huntsville's first public school for African-American students. Councill High School Park is located at the historic site of the former school at 620 St. Clair Ave.



With input from alumni the site plan pays homage to the footprint of the original building through carefully defined walkways, benches and structures made from the original schoolhouse bricks, groves of trees and landscaping that highlight the school's floor plan, and a school entrance with a sculpture of the first student entering the building.

Phase one of the historic park will cost about \$1.4 million and should be completed by May 2020. Phases two and three will include additional bronze sculptures.

UCP Inclusive Mural and Pocket Park



More than a Mural

UCP Huntsville, a DI-based nonprofit that provides services to individuals with disabilities, is working on a community-driven project that features an inclusive mural and public park space. Congrats to UCP on bringing beauty to District 1. This project is a beautiful example of the importance of showcasing people of all abilities in our artwork.

The accompanying "pocket park" located near Max Luther and Blue Springs will include sensory activities and fun seating.

J.O. Johnson Legacy Center

One of the most significant pieces of North Huntsville’s past will soon become one of the most dynamic spots in its future. Devyn explained, “We’re preserving the school’s culture and memories by creating a dynamic new development with the J.O. Johnson Legacy Center as the centerpiece.”



The Johnson Legacy Center is one part of this new development, which will be completed in four phases. Keith describes the facility, however, as “the jewel of the overall development.” Keith said he expects the ribbon cutting to take place in March or April. That’s just the beginning of the redevelopment, though.

The second phase concentrates on a single-family residential plan that will cover 15 acres and include anywhere from 45 to 61 new homes – the first new home construction in North Huntsville in 15 years. The remainder of the old Johnson High building is expected to be torn down during this phase. “We’ll have hookups for food truck rallies and, next fall (after we) tear down part of Johnson High School, we will have a park where we can host festivals and events,” Keith said. “This development is a clear signal that North Huntsville is open for business, and this is only the beginning.”

The third and fourth phases will bring more single-family residential areas, with some serving senior living, and neighborhood commercial projects that complement the development.

Cecil Fain Drive, which connects the campus with Winchester Road, will also be redeveloped during this stage. This includes new street scaping and landscaping, decorative streetlights, sidewalks and bike lanes.



The recreation center will include volleyball courts, indoor soccer fields, a climbing wall, a large fitness area, sauna and meeting rooms. It is expected to be one of the most unique recreation centers in the city given its amenities offered, and it will honor Johnson High with a color scheme of blue and gold.



Richard Showers Center

An Interview with the Director of Richard Showers

Popular Amenities: Classrooms, indoor swimming pool, meeting rooms, satellite library with computers, playground, basketball courts, splash pad, weight room, outdoor pavilions, football /soccer field, and play room.

Renting Space in the Facility:

- Pavilions are priced daily \$25 Monday-Thursday, \$30 Friday-Sunday
- Meeting/classrooms \$25-\$30 per hour depending on size of the room

Programs/Activities: Richard Showers Center has activities for residents between the ages of 6-86. The programs & activities include but are not limited to Summer Camp, Girls Inc., AARP tax prep, Computer Classes, Health Seminars, and Spring Break Programs.

- Splash pad will be completed this spring
- The new HVAC unit was installed and is up and running
- Bus stop canopy completed
- Kiosk available on-site to pay Huntsville Utilities bill

Keeping Neighborhoods Safe





Keeping our Community Safe is a top priority! Huntsville City Council approved a contract to install closed circuit TV cameras in the Meadow Hills neighborhood. A promise kept. Called the Guardian Network, the cameras are part of a new City-wide camera system designed to help protect and serve our residents. It gives police real-time access to cameras operated by the city, businesses and residences.

Some folks might say the cameras remind them of "big brother" watching over them, but as Devyn Keith stated, "I hope the fact they are being installed in Meadow Hills - in my neighborhood - helps reassure everyone they have nothing to fear."

Many cities like ours have had great success in reducing crime through similar shared camera systems. We're fortunate to have the City's first operating cameras supporting our district.

North Precinct Goals & Achievements

2019 Achievement Highlights:

- First shift dropped breaking and entering's and burglaries by 20+%
- Second shift decreased robberies by 15%
- Third shift recovered 33 guns that were stolen or illegally possessed. That's up from 21 in 2018.
- Pedestrian violations on University Drive were stepped up to combat the number of pedestrian accidents directly related to the homelessness in the area
- The twenty-one known sex offenders either complied with the state offender act or moved out of the district
- The precinct facilitated diversity training at the Police Academy
- All North Precinct officers qualified on their weapons due to the increased quarterly range training
- Two new community watch programs were created (Burwell Road and Chalet Circle)
- Oakwood Apartments is diligently working towards achieving the Huntsville Police Blue Star Crime Free status. Started in 2019 and hoping to finish in 2020.
- Block party was held May 18th with the theme "Promoting Unity in the Community." Many residents attended.

New Initiatives in 2020:

Crash Reduction:

North Precinct is implementing a new educational program to help reduce accidents in the district. The program is called "52 Streets in 52 Weeks." Portable radar speed signs will be placed during the year along 52 neighborhood streets to raise awareness about speed and overall driving habits.

Block Party:

This year's theme is "Taking Pride in Northside." The theme reinforces the City's initiative to be a more inclusive community. The goal is to foster positive relationships in the community. #NorthSidePride



What's Being Built?


Have you noticed a flurry of activity on the corner of **Oakwood and Memorial Parkway**? Construction is underway for a new Madison County Service Center. It will house the county tax offices (assessor and collector), License Department, Probate Judge, Board of Registrars and Sales Tax Department.

Here is what we know:

- Two-story complex on 8 acres
- \$11.4 million dollar construction project
- 400 visitors and workers to the area each day
- 190 FREE parking spaces - no more hunting for parking at the Courthouse



Housing Boom in North Huntsville



Huntsville Realtor Chanda Davis exclaimed, "Builders can't get houses up fast enough for the mass amount of people coming to our area!" She indicated that she and her team are very excited about the progress and growth Huntsville has seen in the Real Estate Market. "We have great developers, great builders and we take a lot of pride in our new construction here in Huntsville."

While property value in North Huntsville increases, she said the "inventory is historically low." Houses are selling fast as people look to "hot areas" that are centrally located and offer convenience.

Dealing with those Pesky Potholes...

The City of Huntsville has over 2,300 lane miles of paved roadway within its boundaries.

How a street gets repaved:

- Public Works surveys each street at least once every two years by a team of asphalt inspectors noting changes in the surface condition.
- The street receives a survey score compared to all other streets within the system. **The rating scale is from zero to 60**, with zero representing the best conditions and 60 comprising the worst.
- The road's condition, along with data on the volume of traffic, is factored into a combined score that determines the priority for resurfacing the street.

Based upon these ratings, the City of Huntsville Public Works Department comprises a working list of streets for resurfacing.





- Download the **Huntsville Connect** app on your smart phone – snap a picture and make a report

February and March are "pothole season." Inspectors are constantly driving through the city and checking road conditions. The weather can impact pothole repairs where only a temporary patch is applied until the weather improves.



Drainage Issue?

Ditches and Drainage Problems are handled by the Public Works Department

The Engineering Division is responsible for drainage improvement projects to improve existing drainage facilities and ensure that new developments meet requirements of the City of Huntsville storm water regulations. However, *Drainage problems* caused from heavy rainfall such as flooding of a house or business, extreme street flooding, or storm water getting extremely high and creating a hazard to the public are handled by the **Public Works Department**. Please contact the City of Huntsville Police Department (256) 722-7100 or call 911 if there is an emergency requiring immediate response for safety.

Non-Emergency drainage/ditch Issues can also be reported to Public Works on Huntsville Connect or through the SeeClickFix App or by phone 256-883-3944.



Community Development

Community Development is a division of the Planning Department, its mission is three-fold:

- Stabilization of lower income neighborhoods
- Economic empowerment of lower income persons and/or of persons living in lower income neighborhoods
- Providing assistance to the special needs population in our community

HOUSING PROGRAMS

As part of our ongoing effort to build an inclusive community, Community Development works to ensure that fair and affordable housing options are available to everyone. The City of Huntsville offers a number of programs for current and prospective homeowners, including:

- Rehab of Owner-Occupied homes through our Deferred Home Maintenance Repair Program and World Changers/Community Changers
- First time home buyers program
- Infrastructure - Construction of sewer, drainage, street and sidewalks in qualifying neighborhoods



ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

Grants and loans to support projects which increase the economic well being of lower income residents and residents of lower income neighborhoods.



RECREATION PROJECTS

Construction and rehabilitation of neighborhood parks and other community facilities in qualifying neighborhoods.



SPECIAL NEEDS

Grants and loans to support projects which benefit population groups identified as having special needs.



HOMEOWNERSHIP PROGRAM

In order to help build more inclusive communities and stable neighborhoods, Community Development offers several programs to assist 1st-Time home buyers achieve their dreams of homeownership by providing quality housing at a reasonable price.

Choice Neighborhoods Initiative




The Choice Neighborhoods Initiative (CNI) is focused on three core goals:

- **Housing** - Replace distressed public and assisted housing with high-quality mixed-income housing that is well-managed and responsive to the needs of the surrounding neighborhood.
- **People** - Improve outcomes of households living in the targeted housing related to employment and income, health, and children's education.
- **Neighborhood** - Create the conditions necessary for public and private reinvestment in distressed neighborhoods to offer the kinds of amenities and assets, including safety, good schools, and commercial activity, that are important to families' choices about their community.

Mill Creek Choice Neighborhood



Huntsville was selected as one of only four communities in the 2019 Choice Neighborhoods Initiative (CNI) to be awarded a \$1.3 million planning grant. The money will be used to develop a plan to transform an existing 28 acre area of our city by rebuilding both public and assisted housing into mixed-income communities. The comprehensive process brings together local leaders, current and potential future residents, and a vast array of other community and system stakeholders.

The planning process will last approximately three and one-half years. Once the plan is completed, Huntsville will have the opportunity to compete for a \$30 million dollar implementation grant. The monies can be used for infrastructure, replacement of affordable housing, health and education projects.

Revitalization of Huntsville

Revitalization of D1 is a top priority. Vacant and abandoned properties cause safety concerns, hurt your property value and diminish the neighborhoods we live in. To remove a property deemed a Public Nuisance, Huntsville's Code Enforcement follows the laws and regulations to ensure that everyone's rights are protected.

Stages of the Public Nuisance Act (PNA)

- Property declared Unsafe (condemned)
- Notice issued for the property to be brought into compliance within 60 days
- If property remains non-compliant, owner(s) is cited to Municipal Court.
- If Owner is still unable to bring into compliance before the court date, the court case is dismissed and the City proceeds to the Public Nuisance Act.
- City obtains contractor evaluations to confirm that the property is non-repairable
- Upon confirmation the property is non-repairable, the City Council can approve to remove the structure. The process takes about 60 days.

Things to Note:

**For the vast majority, the City gets compliance for the property from the responsible parties.

**Proper notification is given to all parties to bring a property into compliance before invoking the Public Nuisance Act.



North Huntsville Property Updates

2133 Griffith Dr., NW: Outstanding Unsafe Building and Housing Code notices for this property have been issued. Case has been continued in Municipal Court until 6/17/20. Property may qualify for PNA.

2023 Medaris Rd., NW: A Housing Code notice for this property was issued. Owner requested an extension from the Housing Board of Adjustments and Appeals, Owner granted until 4/6/20.

2117 Atkins Dr., NW: Outstanding Unsafe Building and Housing Code notices for this property have been issued. The Municipal Court case has been continued until 5/20/20. If property remains non-complaint, it will likely qualify to be demolished.

2303 Poplar Ave., NW: Property has been declared unsafe due to fire damage. If the owner does not bring it into compliance, PNA procedure will be followed.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Code Enforcement is another important function of the City's Community Development department. D1 continues to work together to improve the look and feel of our neighborhoods.

- Enforcement of City ordinances related to unsafe buildings
- Substandard housing, junk and litter
- Tall grass and weeds
- Inoperative motor vehicles on right of way
- Removal of structures identified as public nuisances
- Graffiti
- Broken fences
- Neglected swimming pools

Community Development volunteers help with home repairs for residents who qualify for assistance.



Revitalization of D1 Continues:

The removal of properties deemed "Public Nuisances" are important to keep the community safe and protect the value and investment of each property owner. All Public Nuisances are independently assessed by contractors. Most are properties that have been vacant for years and are determined to be non-repairable. When these cases occur, Community Development will notify the homeowner if there is a problem with their property and, if necessary, issue a citation. Special consideration and even assistance may be available for property owners who qualify.

Parks and Recreation Construction Updates

D1 has many moving parts. Five construction projects for City facilities in D1 are simultaneously being constructed or improved. Soon those dirt piles will be replaced with lush lawns and the buildings will be filled with the vibrant folks of Huntsville.

Lantana Park

The irrigation system has been installed and trees have been planted. Sod will be laid as soon as weather allows. The purchase order has been issued for the mural. The artist will begin the mural as weather permits.

Johnson Legacy Center

Consolidated Construction continues working on the interior of the building. The structural steel for the climbing wall and curtain wall has been installed. The contractor continues working to install the new HVAC equipment. Tile is being laid in the locker rooms and restrooms. Painting has started in the corridors and strength/exercise room. The roofing contractor is working to install the new roof and roof trim.

Engineering has awarded the contract to Reed Construction for the rebuilding of Cecil Fain Drive.

North Huntsville Library and Berachah Park

Lee Builders has removed the majority of the temporary structural shoring from the project and has started installing the new foundations and structural steel. The electricians are working to install new conduit. The plumbing contractor is working to install new plumbing at the main restrooms.

The site contractor has completed the mass grading at Berachah Park. They will start fine grading and working on sidewalks as weather allows.

WH Council High Park

Pearce Construction continues to work on site grading as weather allows. The electrician has started installing the main power equipment and conduits.

Shower's Center Pool HVAC Upgrades

Pettus Plumbing and Piping has installed the new HVAC unit and the unit has been started up. The contractor is working on new insulation at the ductwork and installing the new maintenance walkway around the unit.



Huntsville's Palatial Amphitheater



The City of Huntsville is confident that the new amphitheater will help bring in big acts to headline concerts! There are also plans for it to be used for festivals, movie nights and even graduations. The city is envisioning it as a facility that would accommodate year-round community events and activities. In addition to sold out country, rock, or R&B concerts, we expect multi-stage festivals, farmers' markets, art festivals, and free holiday celebrations.

"This is another milestone in our ongoing effort to provide more quality of life options for our community," said Mayor Tommy Battle. "For Huntsville to continue to attract the best and brightest to our City, we're going to need entertainment options that compete with other cities vying for our talent. We believe this amphitheater, with its unique approach to year-round programming, will give Huntsville another differentiator." The anticipated timeline for the opening is **April of 2021**.

2020 CENSUS

Census Timeline

March 12 - 20: Households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.

March 30 - April 1: The Census Bureau will count people who are experiencing homelessness. For this process the Census Bureau counts people in shelters, at soup kitchens on the streets and outdoor locations such as tent encampments.

April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. By this date, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. Once the invitation arrives, you should respond for your home in one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail. When you respond to the census, you'll tell the Census Bureau where you live as of April 1, 2020.

April: Census takers will begin visiting college students who live on campus, people living in senior centers, and others who live among large groups of people. .

May: July: Census takers will begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to help make sure everyone is counted.

December: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.

BE COUNTED, HUNTSVILLE!

The 2020 Census is an opportunity for neighborhoods who have traditionally been considered 'low count areas' to stand up and be counted.

"Historically, areas of town rich in diversity have low or inaccurate counts," Council President Keith said. "We're going to change that this time around. Everyone - no matter your socioeconomic status - deserves to be counted, and we're going to make sure everyone feels comfortable and has the knowledge they need to complete their forms."

"[The Census] is about roads, transit, schools and medical funding," Mayor Battle said. "The number of services - and individuals - impacted by the Census count is far-reaching, and it's why we're standing together as a community to remind Huntsville residents to be counted and to make sure their friends and family are counted."

Connie Graham, the City of Huntsville's Census liaison explained that the U.S. government bases its allocation of funding for federal programs like Pell grants or the National School Lunch program based on population data received every 10 years from the constitutionally mandated U.S. Census.

It's 10 minutes of your time, but those 10 minutes will have 10 years' worth of impact on shaping your future, on shaping Huntsville's future."
